We've just rolled out our first Monday munchies kai pack yesterday. We are hopeful of a few more of these for our tamariki and whaanau before the end of the term. We negotiated with the Ministry of Education to strategically use the funds we had allocated for the school lunch program and how we could best support our whaanau. We consulted a few of our whaanau to see what they would like in a pack. Things that would be useful, especially for those still isolating at home. We did not want those that attend kura to miss out so made sure there was enough for every whaanau that attends our kura to get a pack. We hope you are as wrapped as we are to be able to use this extra support.

We may find ourselves with an ongoing issue of this for a little while longer. The Aotearoa Local History Curriculum - 2023

This is not new to Te Kura Rautau. We are pleased that this will be better resourced from the Ministry of Education. As a kura we have been focused on our local narratives (stories and histories) for a little while. This year and last, the focus for Te Kura Rautau has been on Mana Whenua. We are thankful for the support and energy from our whaanau who have provided guidance and knowledge to get us this far but there is still a lot of work needed. We really need our whaanau to work with us to provide knowledge and share what they know about our local history. We will follow a framework called

te takanga o te wa

There are 3 main points to the framework: Understand - Big Ideas; Know - Context; Do - Inquiry Process What we need now from our community is to hear from you about what our main focus will be. This will shape our School Charter moving forward so we are learning together and sharing an important part of our heritage and history.

Neurodiversity

Your child may show one or more of these: • ADHD • Autistic Spectrum Disorder • Dyspraxia • Dyslexia • Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) • Dyscalculia • Dysgraphia • Meares-Irlen Syndrome • Tourette Syndrome • Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD) • Synesthesia • FASD or Foetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder

Neurodiversity:

Obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD) is a disorder in which people have recurring, unwanted thoughts, ideas or sensations (obsessions) that make them feel driven to do something repetitively (compulsions).

What is the difference between anxiety and OCD?

Though distressing thoughts are a big part of both generalized anxiety disorder and OCD, the key difference is that OCD is characterized by obsessive thoughts and resulting compulsive actions. In contrast, someone with more general anxiety will experience worries without necessarily taking compulsive actions.

Does OCD go away?

Obsessive-compulsive symptoms generally wax and wane over time. Because of this, many individuals diagnosed with OCD may suspect that their OCD comes and goes or even goes away—only to return. However, as mentioned above, obsessive-compulsive traits never truly go away. Instead, they require ongoing management.

School Based Immunisations

Dear Parents / Caregivers,

Public health nurses will be delivering two school-based immunisation programmes in your child's school this year

Year Seven Students

These students will be offered the Boostrix vaccine which is a booster for their early childhood immunisations of tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis (whooping cough). This is the same vaccination that would have been given to your child at 4years age if you consented.

Information about the year seven programme will be given to students at school and this session may include watching the Ministry of Health Presentation on Year Seven Immunisations and is designed specifically for this age group.

At this information session, your child will be given a consent form to bring home for you to read and choose whether or not to have your child immunised by the Public Health Nurses at school. Whether you choose to immunise or not, the form needs to be returned to school.

Year Eight Students

From 1 January 2017, Males and Females aged 9 to 26 inclusive (ie under 27 years) are eligible for HPV (Human Papillomarvirus) immunisation. The focus has historically been on cervical cancer prevention for women but increasing evidence has emerged of the impact of other HPV related cancers on men so both groups will now be offered this vaccine free of charge. This vaccine will be given in two doses 6 months apart.

Information will be given to the students about the HPV vaccination programme at school. This may include viewing the Ministry of Health presentation about the *HPV Vaccine Information and is* for the year 8 age group.

Your child will be given a consent form to bring home for you to choose whether or not to have your child immunised by the Public Health Nurses at school.

- Information on the immunisations is included on the consent form which will be given to your son / daughter at the information session.
- Please complete the consent form and answer all the questions and return the form to school.
- If your child is not being vaccinated at school you still need to fill in the section with your child's name and details on it.
- Please check with your doctor or <u>practice</u> nurse if you are unsure if your child has had a tetanus injection in the last two years.

Highest Needs Review

The Government is committed to ensuring all children and young people can access high-quality education and receive the support they need to succeed in education. It is important that education supports are designed so that the potential of all our children can be fully realised, which is at the heart of what whānau and kaiako strive for every day.

In October 2021, I announced a review of the services provided to learners with the highest learning needs. The Review's online portal is now live and will remain open until 31 March 2022.

The purpose of the review is to ensure that these children and young people, and their families, whānau and aiga, receive the right learning support they need, when they need it, and for as long as they need it. The education journey of children and young people, from early learning to leaving secondary school, falls within the scope of the Review.

Children and young people are our taonga, and it is essential we include their opinions and those of their families, whānau and aiga, as well as teachers, support staff, education leaders and school boards. We want as many people as possible to know about the Highest Needs Review so they can engage and share their opinions on how we can improve and change the services provided to children and young people, within scope of the review.

Having been an educator for 30 years, I know how difficult it can be to navigate the system. This is why I am really keen to hear from you as school leaders, teachers and support staff, and I strongly encourage you to have your say at conversation.education.govt.nz/conversations/highest-needs-review/.

How to report your RAT result



There are two ways to report your rapid antigen test (RAT) result:



You can do it online at MyCovidRecord.nz

- set up a My Health Account if you don't already have one and you're over 12 - you will need your own email address and a valid form of ID
- if you already have a My Health Account, log in
- scroll to "Self-report a Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) result,"
 click "Report test result" and follow the instructions



You can do it over the phone by calling 0800 222 478

- select option 3
- call any time between 8am and 8pm, 7 days a week
- use this to report RAT results for those under 12

Winter Sports Update



Mauri Ora e te whaanau o Te Kura Rautau

Here is a brief run-down of the sports this year and the Covid-19 measurements each code has implemented to give our tamariki the best they can in the current Covid-19 situation.

My Vaccine Pass:

All codes have adapted the MVP in order to have gatherings of up to 100.

All coaches, managers and club officials must be vaccinated.

All children over the age of 12 years and 2months of age must be vaccinated to participate.

ALL CHILDREN PLAYING IN A SCHOOL TEAM ARE GIVEN AN AUTOMATIC MVP - FOR SCHOOL TEAMS ONLY

NKCJFootball & NKCJRugby will have <u>controlled areas</u> (players, coaches, managers and supporters must be vaccinated in these areas) and <u>uncontrolled areas</u> which are up to the general public to maintain covid-19 requirements at all times at a 2m distance.

NKCJHockey will reduce bubble sharing by having games held at different venues rather than just the one venue.

Trust Power Maniapoto Netball Centre will collaborate with Netball NZ, WaiBOP and the NZ Government and will keep you updated as soon as information comes to their attention. Notice will be sent if this affects the winter competition.
